Black crowberry

Empetrum nigrum subsp. hermaphroditum (Hagerup) Böcher, 1952

The crowberry is a shrub that covers the ground, but never grows very high. Its leaves are short, fleshy, with a whitish midrib on the underside. Its flowers are very inconspicuous, usually only noticeable by the large stamens that emerge from them. In contrast, its fruits are easily observed: they are round berries of a beautiful shiny black colour.

Not to confuse

The dwarf water lily (Kalmia palustris) has clearly visible flowers without long stamens and produces red, more or less oval-shaped fruits.
