Purple saxifrage


Saxifraga oppositifolia L., 1753

This saxifrage flowers from February onwards, even at high altitudes. It can be recognised by its beautiful purple flowers with dark purple stamens* that are not very prominent. Its leaves are small, relatively triangular, and form more or less densely grouped columns depending on the altitude. This saxifrage holds the altitude record for a flowering plant in the French Alps: 4070 m, on the south face of the Barre des Ecrins.

*stamens: the stamens are the male reproductive system of flowering plants.

Not to confuse

The truncated saxifrage (S. retusa) has yellow stamen tips, which protrude far beyond the petals. As the name suggests, the two-flowered saxifrage (S. biflora) has its flowers grouped in at least two.
